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

Sacrifice and Legacy: Two Amputees Share a Special Bond



Second World War amputee veteran Lloyd Brown shares a special bond and Remembrance Day tradition with Sean Borle.

ean Borle, 24, recalls meeting Second World War veteran Lloyd Brown, 96, for the first time six years ago at a Remembrance Day ceremony. "We had this magical moment where I reached out my right hand and he put out his left, to shake hands," he says.

Borle was born missing his left hand, and Brown lost his right arm due to the shrapnel of a shell on

October 18, 1944, while serving with the Loyal Edmonton Regiment in

On Remembrance Day, the pair share a special tradition of laying a wreath on behalf of The War Amps, an organization entering its second century of service this year.

The War Amps was started by amputee veterans returning from the First World War to help each other adapt to their new reality as amputees. They then welcomed amputee veterans following the Second World War, sharing all that they had learned.

Borle grew up in The War Amps Child Amputee (CHAMP) **Program**, which pro-


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WILLS & POWERS of ATTORNEY

Waiting until you are at death's door before making a will is a risky business. Chances are that you or your spouse will have children from a previous relationship. If you die without a will Section 2(3) of the Intestate Successions Act (http://web2.gov.mb.ca/laws/statutes/c csm/i085e.php) applies to your estate. That means that your spouse will only get half your estate and half of the second half. While this protects the children of the deceased from being disinherited by a surviving spouse who is not their parent, it can also put that surviving spouse in a huge financial crunch. For example, if there is a house or a farm which forms part of the estate, and the surviving spouse cannot afford to buy out the children's share he or she might have to sell the property and move out. Other rules would also apply to compli-

cate matters, such as the requirement for the administrator of the estate to obtain a bond, which is not necessary if there is a will. Making a will in a timely manner is therefore very advisable. It is also advisable to make an Enduring Power of Attorney at the same time as you make your will. People are living longer these days and often cannot take care of their own affairs as they age. A Power of Attorney gives authority to another trusted person to do this instead. Spouses or adult children are often chosen to do this. If a person becomes mentally incompetent, from a stroke or Alheimers, for example, then it is too late to do a power of attorney. You would have to go to court to get a commiteeship, and this costs thousands of dollars. Loss of a loved-one or loss of one's competence is stressful enough without

having to sort out legal issues at the same time. Thinking ahead and being prepared for what is coming is a very good idea.

These observations are not intended to be legal advice on any matter discussed. Legal problems are very specific in nature and legal professionals should be consulted for best results.

Listening to the Warning Signs: Daughter Turns to Alzheimer Society for Help

When Jane Smith found bags of apples turned to mush in the trunk of her mother's car, it was the first clue that Mary LeBlanc was becoming confused.

Mary told Jane someone had come and picked the apples - but it was Mary who had picked them, put them in the trunk and left them there.

When Mary had a car accident two years later, she told Jane and her brother that she couldn't remember what happened. That was another clue.

Then one Christmas, Mary became distraught about all the strangers in her home. The "strangers" were her family.

Finally, after the family took Mary's car away, she started flagging down drivers on her street asking for a ride to the store. Around that time, Jane discovered that her mom had been making regular visits to the police station to report her daughter had stolen her car.

Asking for Help

That's when Jane turned to the Alzheimer Society of Manitoba in Portage la Prairie, where she and her mother both live. She spoke directly with the Society's Regional Coordinator, who

and walkers

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advised her to have her mom assessed.

Mary was diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease. Fortunately, Jane was able to get her mom into a personal care home in Portage la Prairie soon afterwards.

Today Mary, 85, is a happy and popular resident in the secure unit there. She can walk, talk and feed herself, and Jane and her brother take turns visiting her every day. Her mom has forgiven her for stealing the car, Jane jokes.

But the journey to where they are today isn't a joke. Jane urges families to heed the warning signs and to speak to a doctor or someone at the Society to learn how to navigate the system.

"The Society is on top of everything, and they understand what you are going through," she says. "It's hard on a family when they don't understand why someone doesn't know who they are. It's also hard to be strong all the time."

The people at the Society, says Jane, will help guide and support you on your journey. "They're there for you," she says.



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Manitobans encouraged to get flu vaccine this fall

Emergency Departments, Urgent Care Visits and Hospitalizations Due to Patients Suffering From Flu Creates Backlogs and Increased Wait Times: Friesen

The seasonal flu vaccine is now available free of charge to all Manitobans aged six months and older, Health, Seniors and Active Living Minister Cameron Friesen announced.

Seventeen people with lab-confirmed flu died in Manitoba during last year's flu season, while another 42 were admitted into intensive care units. In total, there were 228 hospitalizations due to influenza. Comparatively, the 2017-18 season hit 10-year highs, with 46 deaths, 35 ICU admissions and 505 hospitalizations.

Emergency department and urgent care visits and hospitalizations due to patients suffering from the flu increases wait times and is costly to the health-care system. Immunization is a cost-effective way to reduce the chance of getting the flu and needing health-care services.

A record number of people received flu vaccines last winter in Manitoba, with more than 336,000 doses administered. In total, 23.6 per cent of people with Manitoba health cards received the vaccine.

A special high-dose seasonal flu vaccine is once again available for senior residents of long-term care facilities. The high-dose vaccine may provide better protection for those at increased risk of complications from the flu, potentially reducing the number of outbreaks experienced in longterm care facilities and better protect those at highest risk of complications.

"As we age our bodies change and it is important that we use all the tools provided to us to ensure we stay healthy. Flu vaccines are a great preventative measure that reduces the risk of illness for all Manitobans, but particularly for older adults," said Tom Farrell, president, Manitoba Association of Senior Centres. "We must also consider those around us, like our spouse, our children, grandchildren and friends. Social connection is very important and avoiding the flu also helps those around us."

The flu vaccine and Pneu-P-23 vaccine, which helps protect against pneumococcal disease and is offered free of charge to seniors, are available at local public health offices, nursing stations, doctors' offices, and Access Centres. Pharmacists can also provide immunization services to people seven years of age and older.

The nasal spray form (FluMist Quadrivalent - AstraZeneca) will not be available in Canada for the 2019-20 influenza season.

Regional health authorities, with the exception of the Winnipeg Regional Health Authority, will conduct immunization clinics.

INFLUENZA AND FLU VACCINE

Influenza is a respiratory virus that can spread easily from one person to another through coughing, sneezing or by touching your mouth, eyes or nose after coming into contact with objects contaminated with the virus.

The vaccine is particularly important for people who are at increased risk of serious illness from the flu, along with their caregivers and close contacts. This includes:

- seniors 65 years of age and older; - residents of personal care homes

or long-term care facilities;

- children six months to five years; - individuals with chronic health conditions such as diabetes, anemia, obesity, cardiac or pulmonary disorders such as asthma;
- health-care workers and first responders;
- regular caregivers of children up

to five years of age; and Indigenous people.

Manitobans over 65 should get a pneumococcal (Pneu-P-23) vaccine at the same time as the **flu vaccine**. The vaccine helps protect against pneumococcal disease, blood infections and meningitis. Both the flu and the Pneu-P-23 vaccine are offered at no charge for people aged 65 and older as well as to some people two years of age and older who are at increased risk of pneumococcal infection. Most people need only one dose of this vaccine in their lifetime.

Manitobans can minimize the risk of getting or spreading the flu also by

shielding their coughs and sneezes, staying home when they are sick and washing their hands regularly.

Provincial Departments release annual reports

Demonstrating Progress, **Ensuring Accountability:** Fieldling

Manitoba government departments have released their annual reports for fiscal year 2018-19 and the results of all provincial programs and services.


"Four years ago, our government was elected to fix the finances, repair the services and rebuild Manitoba's economy," said Finance Minister Scott Fielding.

Accomplishments include:

- reporting a decrease in the number of children in care for the first time in 15 years;
- creating a new Manitoba Economic Development office to lead economic development initiatives and projects with business, industry and stakeholders;
- introducing a new, refundable Child Care Centre Development Tax Credit to stimulate the creation of licensed child-care centres in work places, which helps businesses create strong community connections and meet employees' needs;
- announcing a \$500,000 crime reduction incentive program for police agencies to submit innovative proposals to reduce crime across the province;
- finishing construction on new, state-of-the-art emergency departments in Flin Flon and at Winnipeg's Grace Hospital, as well as creating 60 new, full-time paramedic positions in rural areas;
- meeting the commitment to make at least \$1 billion in strategic infrastructure investments and spend at least \$350 million on roadway infrastructure;
- investing in the Diversity Gardens and the Inuit Art Centre; and
- investing \$102 million to create the new Conservation Trust Fund.

Lac du Bonnet - St. Anthony Petchersky - Ukrainian Catholic - 1937

Tyrrell Mendis, assisted and encouraged by his wife Doreen, has photographed more than 700 places of worship in Manitoba over the past 35 years. It is an ongoing project to record the fast-disappearing relics of our heritage. This was the first church of the parish. It was designed by Father Hewki and built in 1937 with donated materials and volunteer labour of the Ukrainian settlers of Brightstone. Had the name not already been taken Brightstone would have have been Whitestone, named after a nearby stony hill.

The first services were then conducted by priests who came from Winnipeg, especially Rev. Dr. Kushnir, who came frequently.

Due to the influx of settlers from Brightstone in the 1950s a new parish was established in Lac du Bonnet in 1960. Also in 1960, with a donation of \$1,000 the parish purchased 2.75 acres of land and moved the church to Lac du Bonnet. In August 1961 the church was blessed by His Excellency Metropolitan M. Hermaniuk and placed under the



patronage of St. Anthony Petchersky. The parish was served by Rev. Iwanchuk until 1965, and then in suc cession by Rev. George Spolitakewich, Rev. Semen Izyk and Rev. Eugene

Rudachek. The church was visited by

Bishop Myron Daciuk on July 9. 1984. This wooden church is on a masonry foundation. It has a large dome in front. Entry is through an added-on porch. Four columns support the choir loft to the left of the nave. The slightly raised carpeted sanctuary has the sacristy to its right. To the left is a room with the oil-burning stove. Although wired for electricity the chandelier used candles for lighting. The roof is shingled. The walls are clad in imitation stone siding. The interior and ceiling are finished with wood siding and press board.

Other than for the framed painting behind the main altar Jesus Christ Lover of Mankind (signed "Kostur V. 1938"), the holy images on the walls are all oil paintings.

After closure the church was moved from Lac du Bonnet to north of Old Pinawa beside Provincial Road 520.

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

Jack McCallum has been a fixture in Manitoba baseball circles for decades. This year, he will be honoured for his service.

McCallum will become the first Honourary Life Member selected by the Manitoba Baseball Hall of Fame when the Manitoba Baseball Hall of Fame holds its 24th annual induction banquet on Saturday, June 6, 2020, at the Morden Event Access Centre.

McCallum will enter the Hall this year alongside individuals Ron Arnst, Les Charles, Blaine Fortin, Andrew Halpenny, John Kroeker, Morris Mott and Kalam Paull; minor club teams' Carman Goldeyes Midgets 1994-95 and 1997-2000, the Elmwood Giants Juniors from 2002-2007 and the Cardale Cougars Bantams, Midgets and Bisons from 1971-75; and a special category team, the 1991 Portage Athletics Midgets.


Callum, 83, was a member of the Manitoba Baseball Hall of Fame Board of Directors from 1998 to 2017 and was Chairman of the Board of Directors from 2003 to 2011. As Chairman he was responsible for two important initiatives: He worked tirelessly to make the local Morden Committee an important contributor to decisions made by the Board and he was the person most responsible


for the success of Baseball Manitoba's Museum expansion project in 2008-2010.

Callum will be joined in the Hall in 2020 along with the following inductees:

Ron Arnst, Winnipeg: The former station manager at CKLQ in Brandon, Arnst, 69, grew up playing minor ball in Saskatchewan. He broadcast games in the Manitoba Senior Baseball League and did play-by-play of Western Canada Championships. He was the in-house announcer at Canadian National Senior Championship tournaments held in the Westman area and was part of the organizing committee that brought the 1991 World Youth Championships to Brandon. Since 1994 Ron has been the park announcer for the Winnipeg Goldeyes. Les Charles, Didsbury, Alta.: As one of the better players in the Souris minor baseball program Didsbury, 53, had an outstanding career in the Manitoba Senior Baseball League from 1978 to 1993 as a pitcher and hard-hitting infielder. He won a national championship as a member of the 1981 Bison team, as they took the gold medal in Sarnia, ON. In 1985 Les was a member of Team Manitoba at both the Nationals in Nova Scotia and Westerns in Vancouver. In 1989 he represented Manitoba at Westerns in St. Albert, AB. Blaine Fortin, Lundar: By the time Fortin, 42, completed his 16-year old season in 1994 he had already compiled a resume worthy of Hall of Fame admission. That year alone he

played at the Midget, Junior, and Senior level and played on the Provincial Youth Team. He was also chosen to play on Team Canada at the World Youth Championships in Brandon where he batted .346. He was named Manitoba's Minor Player of the Year in both 1993 and 1994 and Baseball Canada's Youth Player of the Year in '94. His talent and awards caught the eye of the Toronto Blue Jays who drafted him in the sixth round and third Canadian overall of the MLB Entry Draft. He played three years of professional minor league ball from 1995-97 for Blue Jay affiliates in Dunedin, St. Catherines and Medicine Hat.

Andrew Halpenny, Winnipeg: Halpenny, 47, started his minor ball career in his hometown Selkirk but soon advanced to represent Manitoba at the national and international level. In 1990 Andrew was catcher for Team Manitoba and then for Team Canada at the World Youth tournament in Cuba. He earned a scholarship to the National Baseball Institute in Vancouver and in 1993 he represented Manitoba at the Sumer Games in Kamloops. In 1994 Andrew was signed by the Winnipeg Goldeyes and spent three years with the team. In 1997 Andrew opened Rookies Baseball Experience, Canada's first indoor baseball and softball teaching facility.

John Kroeker, Stonewall: Manitoba's own Field of Dreams exists today in Stonewall thanks mainly to the efforts of John Kroeker. Opened in 1995 and known as Diamond No. 1, Quarry Park is a world-class, lighted facility that has attracted provincial

and national tournaments. Kroeker, 71, had been active in Stonewall baseball since 1987 when he joined the Minor Baseball executive. He also coached Minor ball from 1987-93. He chaired several baseball committees and in 1994 was named Baseball Manitoba Volunteer of the Year and Sport Manitoba's Volunteer of the Year. Morris Mott, Brandon: Morris grew up playing both baseball and hockey in rural Saskatchewan. Although now better known for his hockey career, Morris was good enough on the diamond to be inducted as a player into the Saskatchewan Baseball Hall of Fame in 2002. Mott, 73, played some senior ball after moving to Manitoba but his work with the Manitoba Baseball Hall of Fame has been instrumental in its success. Over seven years, 2013-19, Morris's strong leadership served the Hall of Fame well as Board Chairman.

Kalam Paull, LaSalle: Starting in 1989, Paull, 47, was a member of the Manitoba Youth Team and helped pitch the Elmwood Giants to a provincial Midget title. In 1990 he dominated locally as a MJBL all-star and Top Pitcher as he led his Junior team to the league championship and was named Manitoba's Junior Player of the year. He again dominated the MJBL in 1991 by throwing two no hitters and being named MVP and top Pitcher. Kalam next took his talented arm to US college ball for four years along with a season at the National Baseball Institute in Vancouver. He turned professional with the Winnipeg Goldeyes and



Carman Goldeyes Midgets 1994-95 and Juniors 1997-2000: This talented group of players dominated the Manitoba Midget classification for two years and many went on to continue winning even more championships with the Junior Goldeyes for four years. In 1995 the Midgets captured the Western Canada title before bringing home a silver medal from the National Midget tournament in Stonewall. The Carman Juniors were

the first team in league history to win four straight Manitoba Junior League titles.

Minor Team. Cardale Cougars Bantams/Midgets/Bisons 1971-75: The hamlet of Cardale managed to dominate Manitoba minor baseball form 1971-75 with a core group of nine local players coached by Graeme Shaw, Only future major leaguer Terry Puhl prevented them from claiming National titles in 1971 and 1973. The 1975 Bison edition of the Cougars captured the Western Manitoba Bison Baseball League

pennant and playoffs but finally lost to Winnipeg in the provincial final. **Minor Team: Elmwood Giants Juniors 2002-2007:** The Giants represented the province all six years in either Western Canada or National championships. Four times they were Manitoba Junior Baseball League and provincial champions (2003, 2005, 2006 and 2007) and attended the Baseball Canada National events. Their best performance was at the 2006 Nationals, where they were unbeaten in round-robin play but lost two close games to finish 4th.

The other 2 years they hosted the Western Canada championships at Koskie Fleld, placing third both years. **Special Team. Portage Athletics Midgets 1991:** The ultimate achievement for the 1991 Portage Midgets was winning the National Midget Championship held in Saskatoon. No Manitoba Midget team had ever achieved this goal before and none have been able to accomplish it since.

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



The Material Girls By Leone Newton

Our quilting group, The Material Girls, was formed in the fall of 1999 with meetings hosted bi-weekly in our own homes. The group emphasis is quilting but other creative handwork is also done by our members.

To accommodate our increasing membership, we moved to the East St. Paul 55+ Centre in 2006. A year later we successfully held an exhibition there showcasing our creations of quilts and needlework. Successive Quilt Shows have been held in 2013 at the 55+ Centre and then in 2016 in the Community Centre hall.

Another noteworthy group project was the creation of a spectacular full size quilt depicting all areas of Manitoba for the 2009 Manitoba Homecoming. Although we didn't win the competition, our quilt was displayed at the Manitoba Legislature, the Red River Exhibition, and the Royal Manitoba Winter Fair in Brandon as well as at the Grand Finale Gala at the Victoria Inn in Brandon. We sold the quilt after it

was displayed that summer in a Manitoba Tourist Centre.

In 2016 East St. Paul celebrated its Centennial and we were asked by the Municipal Council to create a quilt for the occasion. We designed and constructed a very special quilt, keeping in mind the history of the municipality as it developed during the 100 year period. On November 3, 2015, at a special meeting in the Council Chambers, the commemorative quilt was unveiled and remains on display there. With the fabric left, plus donations from our members, we made over 30 lap covers for the comfort of Middle Church Home residents.

Ongoing group and individual projects include charity quilts for hospitals and community service needs. For a Christmas 2016 project, over 40 stockings were sewn and then filled with items purchased with a 55+ Club donation. Another Christmas project involved members making a specific block using seasonal fabrics. They were then all

sewn together to create Christmas tablecloths for the 55+ Centre.

We sometimes participate in 'challenge projects'. In 2012 the challenge was one in which colours from a sample fabric, specific dimensions and a particular block were required. The card player membership judged for 'favorite' and in return we supplied coffee and sweets.

In 2015 the challenge involved paint chips. Each participant was given three paint chips for the colours to be used in a specified sized quilt.

The Tula Pink Challenge of 2017 required those to use at least 20 - 6" blocks chosen from a design book by that name. The book featured 100 different blocks to choose from. The results were astonishing.

Last year we challenged ourselves to create a 'Log Cabin Block Quilt'. It was amazing to see the variety of designs using only log cabin blocks.

We have 36 members, but membership numbers continue to increase. We now meet year round every Wednesday 10 am-4 pm, as well as the 1st, 3rd and 5th Mondays, 11 am-4 pm.

Thanks to the East St. Paul Municipality for giving us the wonderful meeting and working space in the 55+ Centre. ■





Separate biscuits. Firmly press in bottom and sides of lightly greased muffin tin. Spoon beef mixture evenly between muffin cups. Sprinkle with cheese.

Bake in preheated 400 F (200 C) oven for 10 to 12 minutes. Cool slightly before removing from pan.





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
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
